ATHLETICS MIC MARLIZE HAYWARD

We kicked off this season with the inter-school competitions. Westville Boys' High School was very well represented. We had great successes at various schools. We are proud to announce that at Kingsway interschool, Jaryd Coetzee broke the long jump record which was set in 2009 (5.58m) with a new distance of 5.63m. 15 schools competed and we were placed second overall on the day.

We also competed at the KZN League Meetings, which we used as preparation for the KZN Schools Championship.

With WBHS continued success on the track we were again invited to participate at the prestigious Tuks Top Ten in Pretoria. This competition was attended by schools from all over South Africa and Namibia. We were far more experienced than in previous years and our athletes elevated their attitudes and it reflected in their performances. Top performers at TUKS were as follows: Daniel Ellis bronze (3000m) and Elijah Watt silver (2000m steeplechase)

Once again we were invited to compete at the Puma School of Speed Competition. Our athletes were a force to be reckoned with, collecting 8 medals.

20 of our boys were selected for the PADSA Team to compete at the KZN Schools and Club Championship at Kings Park. A few boys also competed at the KZN Club Championships.

We collected ten medals at the KZN School Championship. Most of our Athletes improved on their personal bests at this event. Kevin van der Berg and Testimony Dodo got gold in javelin, Jaryd Coetzee got bronze in javelin, Josh Janse Van Rensburg got silver for triple jump, Leon Saayman got silver in high jump and bronze in triple jump, Bryce Stockton got gold in discus, Daniel Kriek got silver in the 400m hurdles and silver in javelin, and lastly Barnard Nortje got bronze in shot put.

2 of our athletes were selected for the KZN school's athletics team. Namely, Josh Janse Van Rensburg u/15(Triple jump) and Testimony Dodo u19 (javelin).

SALGA once again invited boys from our school to compete. Robert Everson and Tiaan Kriek were the boys to go and their placings were as follows- Tiaan collected gold in Javelin and Robert placed 4th in discus and shotput.

We continued with our consistent performances and achievements in our KZN Sub Youth category with Josh Janse Van Rensburg, Leon Saayman and Jaryd Coetzee achieving the KZN standard inter – provincial criteria and standing out on the day. Josh Janse Van Rensburg collected 3 medals and Jaryd Coetzee 1. This put both of them in line to go to SA's in Sasolburg later this year.

By the end of the season, we had won 13 championship medals for the year and had 2 of our boys selected as KZN representatives. Our overall achievements ranked us as one of the top Athletics school in KwaZulu-Natal.

This year's basketball season was a fairly successful one for the school with some promising results in both the domestic fixtures and tournaments that we attended. This was all made possible by the passion and dedication of the entire coaching staff. We are fortunate that we have many old boys in the system and this allows for greater success in a shorter period of time. With the enthusiasm and coaching abilities of the whole coaching staff we were able to achieve fairly good results throughout both seasons.

The school now boasts 19 Basketball Teams and few local schools match us down the line with regards to fixtures. An internal development league on a Friday accommodates boys who are unable to make representative teams and greater plans lie ahead for further development and enhancement in 2020.

Westville Boys' High launched and hosted its first u14 Basketball Festival this year. It was well supported with 8 KZN Schools getting involved. We hope to make the Festival bigger and better in 2020 along with plans of a Stayers and u15 Basketball Tournament.

On the domestic front, the 1st Team had a fair season, winning 4 and losing 4. The standard of basketball and coaching in KZN has increased drastically in the last two years and many schools are starting to take their basketball seriously. Westville will need to work even harder to maintain standards that have been set in the past. In 2017, the 1st Team were ranked 4th in the Country and the boys worked hard to create a legacy of their own in 2019. The yearly tour to Johannesburg saw the 1st Team get knocked out of the Quarter-Finals in overtime against the American International School of Johannesburg (eventual finalists). These results combined with the domestic season saw Westville ranked 9th in SA. There is also an exciting group of youngsters coming through who should blossom next year. They have already made their mark in the Stayers Team and the future looks bright.

The u16A Team struggled to get fluidity this year. Domestically they won 3 and lost 4 of their games. A few of these boys have progressed to the Stayers Team and are seemingly finding their rhythm playing with some of the older boys. The u15A Team are definitely the team to watch out for in the future. This team did well at the Michaelhouse u16 Tournament and playing them in higher age-group competitions has benefited them greatly. Domestically they won 5 and narrowly lost 2 of their games. This team is highly motivated and is currently unbeaten in the 2nd season of 2019. The u14A Team is made up of some really talented young men. These boys won 5 and lost just two of their domestic fixtures this year. At the recent St. Andrew's Basketball Festival, they lost all but one of their 7 fixtures. Our junior teams are competing at exceptional levels and these boys will take Westville Basketball to new heights.

This was all made possible by the leadership and dedication of the 1st Team Coaches (Ryan Liberty / Bradley Wood) and respective A Team Coaches (Njabulo Zulu / Reagan Stuart / Keith Evans, Nikoalas Karydas / Clive Barker, Preston Jollands / Kingsley Jollands). With the enthusiasm and coaching abilities of the coaching staff, we were able to achieve great results and maintain high standards throughout the season.

The 1st Team Coaching Staff have been fortunate in the sense that they have been working with the squad since February this year. They have also had the opportunity to draw from a large pool of players and have been able to implement the style of football as well as the culture that Westville Football has been lacking.

Time and Location: Dairy beach, Durban on a Friday afternoon from 3 to 5 p.m.

The KZN Schools surfing league competitions are run on a tag team format. Each team consists of 5 surfers and they have 50 minutes to complete the surfing of the entire team. Each surfer paddles out and catches 2 waves and these scores are added together to achieve a team total. A panel of 3 judges score the waves on a scale 1-10 and points are deducted for the team not completing the required amount of waves in the allotted time. Things get really exciting, especially toward the end when time is running short. There is a lot of shouting and indicating from the team on the beach to the remaining surfer in the water.

It all started off with 2 sets of trials and a practice session in March during the 1st term to select teams and introduce young surfers to the competitive format. The KZN Schools Surfing League started on the 12th April. All the teams had an opportunity to surf against one another during the term culminating in the final events that took place on Friday 7th June for the individual competition held at Dairy Beach and the team finals were held at The Ballito Pro Junior in Ballito on the 28th of June. For most part the weather was great but the surf was very small and as a result our bigger Westville surfers were slightly more challenged in the small conditions. A few of the contests had to be moved further north to the beach in front of the Bike n Bean where conditions offered bigger waves. One event had to be rescheduled and another had to be cancelled completely because of pollution in the harbour and strike action that took place in the city.

Westville 1st **team:** Daniel Trevethan (Captain), David MacDonald, Caden Coetzee, Caleb Daly and James Lamusse. Nick Harrison surfed 3 of the contests in place of injuries and illness. The team surfed consistently and earned their place straight into the finals bypassing the semi-finals.

This team was the Matric team and had a lot of fun but failed to impress very much in the competitions. Of all the teams it was very rewarding seeing the young men in this team supporting each other and creativing a positive spirit. **Westville 3rd team:** Jarod Pretorius, Ethan Pretorius, Josh Burnett, Matt Laudenberg, Drew Dorfling and Leith Hair. The team was very good and competed well and beat our 2nd team on one occasion. Unfortunately they did not manage a finals place but as most still have a few years left at school, will prove to be our 1st team members in the years to come. There were some difficulties with getting them to every event as many injuries during the season depleted this team quite severely, but they still impressed.

Added to the team events this year was an individual category for the best surfer at the KZN Schools. Based on performance during the tag team contests 20 surfers were selected to compete for the individual title of the KZN Schools surfing league. Westville had 4 surfers invited in David MacDonald, Caden Coetsee, Caleb Daley and Daniel Trevethan. Caleb Daley and Caden Coetsee made it to their respective quarter finals but were unable to progress any further.

Due to the team finals being held at the Ballito Pro Junior during the June holidays, too many of our surfers were unable to make it to the event for us to field one team, but our first team was placed in 3rd place after all the events leading up to the finals, and we had a straight shot into the finals, bypassing the semi finals. If the event is held at the Ballito Pro again next year a more concerted effort will be made to ensure the boys are available during their holidays.

On the positive side we seems to have a growing number of strong young surfers that can help keep the teams competitive in the coming few years, The sport of surfing has fantastic popularity in Westville and where our boys may not always be the best in the water, they love to be offered this opportunity to develop in a sport that will be an important recreation the rest of their lives.



Westville continued to dominate relay swimming in both KZN and Gauteng boys' high schools in 2019 and have not lost a gala anywhere in those areas since March 2007 and have now gone 81 galas without defeat.

The season always begins with the School Champs gala where the top swimmers can show off their talents and try break school records that may have been set by WBHS boys who went on the swim at the Olympics.

The first record to fall was Ian Brijlals 2018 u15 Free record which broken by Luca Holtzhausen. Luca went on to break another of Brijlals records in the breastroke, the 2011 backstroke record, the 2014 Fly record and finally the 100 medley record to give him a tally of 5 golds and 5 records. Matthew Bosch broke the 2013 100m IM u19 record to round off an evening of very competitive swimming.

The WBHS gala, now named the Nestor Periedes Gala was once again hosted at the Westville aquatics centre in the awesome balmy weather that Durban is famous for in summer. Grey College were once again very strong in all their age groups and never finished out of the top 3 while St. David's and St Benedict's had a very balanced all round teams who competed fiercely against each other and both pushed Westville in every race.

Westville started very well by winning 4 of the freestyle events with the u15 team (Pillay , Wessels Holtshausen, Tarr) keeping the record and the u19 team (Irvine, Bosch , MacDonald, Rayment) breaking a WBHS 2013 record in the 4 x 100m Freestyle relay. The breaststroke is traditionally not the strongest event for WBHS but this year , we won all but the u19s who git touched into second place by Grey College. The u15 team (Gauch , Wessels, Holtzhausen, Tarr) sneaked under the WBHS 2018 record and the u17 team (Duckham , Smith Mayer, Grobler) also swam well to better the 2011 WBHS record by 0.08s . The backstroke is always a nervous time for coaches as teams can commit many errors to be disqualified but the WBHS team did not disappoint and won all 5 events. The u15 team (Holtzhausen, Pillay, Els, Gauche) broke the WBHS 2011 record and the u19 team (Rayment ,Burgess ,Irvine ,MacDonald)kept the ball rolling breaking the 10 year old WBHS record by 0.8s. Westville are traditionally favourites in the fly and did not disappoint with all the age groups winning and the u19 team (Irvine, Burgess, Bosch, Rayment) breaking the 2013 WBHS record.

The medleys are always interesting as a school only needs one good swimmer per stroke and some very good times were posted but WBHS were too good on the evening and won all 5 races with the u15 team (Tarr, Holtzhausen, Pillay, Els) breaking the 2018 record by more than 2 seconds .The u17s (Duckham, Grobler, Beukes, Mayer) broke the 2011 WBHS record and the u19s (MacDonald, Bosch , Rayment, Irvine) smashed the 2018 record by more than 3 seconds . The ladder freestyle is the ultimate event of the evening as a school needs only one good swimmer per age group and anyone can win. The record was set last year after standing for 19 years and yet was broken again this year by (Cartwright, Holtzhausen, Parry, Mayer and Bosch to put another notch on the trophy.
